*Water is for Fighting Over: and Other Myths about Water in the West* by John Fleck (Island Press 2016)

Recommended text: *Water Law in a Nutshell,* 6<sup>th</sup> Edition, by Sandra B. Zellmer and Adell L. Amos (West Academic Publishing 2021)

This is a writing course but reading the casebook and participating in class discussion is important for mastery of the subject. 20 percent of the grade will be based on a critical book review of the Fleck book, 5 pages in length, double-spaced, 12-point Times New Roman type. 80 percent of the grade will be based on two papers on topics agreed to by the instructor, 15 pages in length, again, double-spaced, 12-point Times New Roman type with appropriate legal citations. Each paper will be 40 percent of the grade (for a total of 80 percent).

The book review will be due on <u>September 30th</u> with a group discussion to follow in a subsequent class. Begin reading now!

The first paper will be due by <u>November 5th</u>, and the second paper will be due on <u>December 3<sup>rd</sup></u>.

Class sessions will be set aside for students to brief their peers on their proposed topics and then to present the papers when completed.

Voluntary make-up classes be on Saturday mornings at 9am.

- Basic understanding of prior appropriations and riparian water law regimes.
- Basic understanding of federal and tribal reserved water rights.
- Basic understanding of federal common law on equitable apportionment of interstate waters, interstate compacts
- Basic understanding of legal regimes governing groundwater
