COURSE OVERVIEW

We will be exploring the law of torts, most often defined as some variation of: a wrongful act or an infringement of a right (other than under contract) leading to civil legal liability. Tort law helps to define each person's responsibilities for existing in society, tackling questions like:

• What can we expect from the people around us? What legal obligations do they have to avoid causing harm to us, either accidentally or intentionally?

- When are we required to compensate others for accidents we cause?
- How does society place monetary value on harm to persons and property?

There are three overarching types of torts that we will cover in the following order:

(1) intentional torts
(2) negligence, and
(3) strict liability torts.

Within each, we generally will cover what a *prima facie* case entails (i.e., what a plaintiff needs to prove to establish a claim), what defenses exist, and a variety of special situations. The bulk of the course will be spent on negligence. Finally, at the end of the course, we will discuss what damages are available.
