COURSE OVERVIEW/DESCRIPTION: This survey course emphasizes federal copyright, trademark, and patent law and related state trade secret, rights of publicity, and unfair competition law. It is meant to provide students with a general working knowledge of the various intellectual property doctrines, and an understanding of how the individual intellectual property doctrines compare, contrast, and may be used to complement one another. This course is appropriate for the generalist who wants to understand and be able to analyze IP issues, which are ubiquitous in the modern practice of law.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: By the end of the course students should be able to:

- Understand and apply the major doctrines of intellectual property and related fields covered in the course in legal practice
- Argue policy considerations across and within each area of intellectual property
- Show basic proficiency in developing intellectual property strategies for clients

BASIS OF EVALUATION & ASSESSMENTS

- <u>Class Participation:</u> You are expected to participate regularly in class. A mix of cold calling and assigned "on call" students will be used. You may "pass" when called upon up to two (2) times during the semester, but after that two (2) points will be deducted from your class participation grade for any time you decline to answer the instructor's question or request for a comment.
- <u>Grading Policy</u>: Grading is based on a one hundred (100) point scale. For class participation, students presumptively obtain full points for completion and compliance, subject to deductions set out above and here. Quizzes and the final exam by contrast are based on earned points.
- <u>Quizzes</u>: thirty (30) points overall broken into ten (10) points for each short answer quiz for

patents, copyrights, and trademarks

- <u>Class participation</u>: ten (10) points subject to deduction set out above
- <u>Final Exam</u>: sixty (60) points; seven (7) hour, take home, internet-blocked open exam including a combination of short answer and essay questions.

EMAIL COMMUNICATION: Students must use their Mason email account to receive important University information, including communications related to this class. This is especially important for security and confidentiality of client information. I will not respond to messages sent from or send messages to a non-Mason email address.

ATTENDANCE: Regular and punctual attendance are required to earn academic credit. Attendance requirements for academic credit will follow the policies set forth in Academic Regulation 4-1. Law School instructors and administrators reserve the right to use AI detection software to find instances of GAI in student submissions.*
