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I will teach students to effectively influence the U.S. federal rulemaking process. I will explain

- a) the way that the federal regulatory process works,
- b) the role that public comments play in agency decision making,
- c) the practical strategies for writing comments that are more likely to alter regulatory decisions, and
- d) the content and style of writing that is best suited to this aspect of administrative law.

Students are expected to learn to

- a) persuasively communicate views in writing;
- b) deliver written assignments that have only rare errors of grammar, mechanics, and usage;
- c) clearly explain meaningful concepts; and
- d) improve written text.

Assignments and Grading: No group work. All assignments graded on the Scalia curve.

- Brief editing and writing (20% total, each due 11:59 PM on the Friday after it is assigned). Ten, brief editing/writing assignments to practice improving text and communicating clearly. Late work on these assignments will not be accepted.
- Substantive editing of a regulatory comment (35%, **due 11:59 PM, 3/10**). Use the techniques and knowledge learned in the course to improve an assigned comment on a significant regulatory action.
- Writing a comment on a federal rulemaking (45%, **due 11:59 PM, 4/24**). Use the techniques and strategies learned in the course, including specifying how the rule should be changed.

<u>Late penalty</u>: one letter grade for the first 24 hours; after that, zero credit for the assignment. Class participation will not be a factor in grading.
