Course Description and Learning Objectives

Through the Vis Moot experience, students will learn and address complex issues regarding arbitral jurisdiction and procedure and substantive law regarding the international sale of goods. They will learn to identify issues, perform research on international arbitration and the CISG, and write persuasive memorials in an international arbitration setting.

George Mason University has participated in the Vis Moot since 2012 and has regularly reached the elimination rounds of the competition. Participating in this competition will teach you practical skills in representing clients in a global commercial marketplace.

Students are not required to participate in the Vis Moot competition. The course has a parallel track for students interested in writing a paper on international commercial arbitration.

Attendance

Students must meet the GMU attendance policy requirements.

Grading

Grades are based on your written individual and small group work product, your performance on assigned class presentations, and your informed participation in class. The grading breaks down as follows: Written Memorandum or Individual Research Paper (60%), Legal Issue Paper and Presentation (25%), and Participation (15%).
