<u>Course Overview</u>: This course covers the basics of bankruptcies filed by individuals and entities including liquidation under chapter 7 of the Bankruptcy Code, reorganization for individuals under chapter 13 of the Bankruptcy Code and reorganization for entities under chapter 11 of the Bankruptcy Code.

<u>Learning Outcomes</u>: By the end of this course students will:

- Understand the philosophy of bankruptcy as applied to individuals and entities facing serious financial hardships;
- Understand the relationship between bankruptcy law and other laws related to financial transactions and issues such as real estate law or the Uniform Commercial Code;
- Be able to identify when and why an individual or an entity should consider using bankruptcy as a solution to financial hardships;
- Know how to use bankruptcy to resolve financial hardships encountered by individuals and entities; and
- Know how to use the Bankruptcy Code and Bankruptcy Rules to protect the rights of creditors.

Instructor Expectations and Course Structure:

- Students are expected to read assigned Text materials in advance of each class and are encouraged to participate during class by way of discussion and questions.
- This is an advanced course and not taught using the Socratic Method. Students will not be called on specifically but will be encouraged to volunteer their participation.
- Additional materials will be shared during the course by way of TWEN and email. Students are encouraged to use their MasonLive email accounts but may request email communications using other email addresses.

Attendance: Regular and punctual attendance is required to earn academic credit. Attendance requirements for academic credit will follow the policies set forth in Academic Regulation 4-1. Should a student anticipate missing a substantial number of class sessions (*e.g.* because of a serious illness), the student should immediately contact the Assistant Dean, Student Academic Affairs.

I will keep attendance during the course and will mark a student as absent if not seen visually. In accordance with Academic Regulation 4-1.1, "A student who is not present for at least 75 percent of a session of the course is absent from that session." If a student misses more than four class sessions, I am obligated to report such absences to the Assistant Dean, Student Academic Affairs.

<u>Class Recordings Prohibited</u>: Pursuant to Academic Regulation 4-2.2, no portion of a class session or an examination may be preserved by means of a recording device such as an audio recording device or camera. Any exceptions to this policy must be expressly permitted in writing by me.

<u>Exam</u>: The exam for this course is take-home with open book. Any resources may be used during the taking of the exam <u>EXCEPT</u> other students, friends, colleagues or any other persons may not be used. Students may take the exam at any time during the exam period (December 3 – December 18, 2024) provided (i) each student must pick up the exam from and return the exam and answer to the Recorders Office within a 24-hour

period; and (ii) the exam must be returned before the end of the exam period (COB December 18). The exam will be two fact patterns with three or four questions for each fact pattern.
