Students are responsible for the assigned materials for each class session and are expected to participate in class discussion. Students should be prepared to explain and discuss the basic aspects of assigned cases, i.e. the parties, the controversy, the legal doctrines at issue, and the holding.

Anticipated Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the course, students should:

- Know the requirements of a valid (enforceable) contract;
- Understand the limits of contracts in the real world;
- Understand how to think proactively about potential issues or problems in contractual relationships and how to address them in contract language;

• How courts approach contract disputes and thus how the potential for litigation informs contract negotiations and the settlement of disputes.

Syllabus Subject to Modification

This syllabus sets out an expected schedule of course materials. It is understood, however, that there should be flexibility where circumstances, or the needs of the class, necessitate it. Some issues or cases may require more time devoted to them than initially expected, and modifications to the syllabus may be made as a result.
