COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course gives a transaction-focused introduction to the laws governing business associations. We will focus on the corporate entity form but will also discuss other forms of business association. We will discuss legal issues relevant to partnerships, LLCs, and corporations, including conceptions of agency that are an important building block of business associations, limited liability, fiduciary duties, corporate governance, private equity, issues related to boards and shareholders, and corporate finance. This course will focus to a significant degree on real world business contexts in which matters concerning business associations arise. We will use case studies and current events to supplement assigned readings.

COURSE GOALS

This class will use and further develop students' abilities in research on assigned current events topics, writing, analysis, problem-solving, and communication, including through required class presentations.

- understanding about recent debates surrounding the role of corporations in society
- understanding about the role of lawyers in matters related to corporations and other business entity forms
- competence in researching and analyzing business and business entity form issues
- experience with project management and teamwork skills
- competence in written and oral communication
- experience with technologies students are likely to encounter after graduation, including generative AI

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS

This course is interactive and will incorporate discussion of relevant current events. Class sessions may include group projects. This course will cover issues related to business and business law and may involve calculations.

Course Requirements

- 1. PARTICIPATION
- Participation will include different components, including:
 - Participation on panel (on-call) -sign up sheets available at Google Drive -- minimum of THREE panel appearances are required

<u>Participation – Assessment and Evaluation</u>: Class Panel participation and class participation outside of panel (i.e., participation when you have not signed up for panel for a particular day) will be assessed based on the following criteria:

2. GENERATIVE AI COMPANY REPORT

- You must complete a generative AI Company Report this semester
- This report may include a discussion of no more than 10 pages (double-spaced with 1 inch margins on all sides) plus any exhibits relevant to your discussion
 - This is a MAXIMUM number of pages, not a target
- You can choose any company incorporated in the United States about which you can obtain information
 - This typically means that the company must be a public company
- Your report can deal with a potentially broad range of topics of your choice but should track the topics covered in class
 - Reports may vary depending on the company selected
- You must generate your report in collaboration with a generative AI application (e.g., any version of ChatGPT, Google Bard, Claude AI, and similar applications)
- Evaluation of tour report will be included in your participation grade
- Please include results generated by the generative AI applications you use in an Exhibit to your report
- You will be evaluated based on how you engaged with the generative AI application to improve the results from your queries

Generative AI Company Report: Generative AI

Company Reports will be included in your participation grade and will be assessed based on the following criteria:

- Choice of company
- Engagement with issues related to business associations
- Collaboration with generative AI application(s)
- Your discussion of process and results from your collaboration
- Extent to which you improved the information generated by the generative AI application(s) you used

3. FINAL EXAM

- The final exam may include a combination of multiple choice and short answer questions that will be based on class readings and material discussed in class sessions, including themes and issues discussed in class presentations
- Additional information concerning the final exam will be made available later in the semester

Final Exam – Assessment and Evaluation: Final Exams will be assessed based on the following criteria:

- In the case of any multiple choice questions, correctness of the answer
- In the case of any short answer questions, the extent to which the answer addresses the question asked within the confines of any specified word limit
- In the case of any essay questions and answers to hypothetical scenarios, scenarios based on real-world events and other non-mathematical problems (other than short answer questions, multiple choice questions, or other types of questions identified above), the following criteria:
 - Ability to identify relevant issues
 - Identification, discussion, and analysis of laws, regulations, and other important factors relevant to the issues identified
 - Implications of discussion and analysis / Conclusions / Answer
 - Answer to question actually asked
 - Please be sure to go back and read the question frequently as you complete your answer to ensure that you answer is fully responsive to the question actually asked
 - Identification of areas of uncertainty or unknowns that might impact your discussion, analysis, and conclusion(s) of discussion and analysis
 - Compliance with any word limits
