Course Description:

This lecture course will explore the distribution of national security powers amongst the three coordinate branches of government and engage students in understanding the laws and policies that govern the legality of war, military operations in wartime, intelligence collection, protection of national security information, foreign intelligence surveillance, covert action, special military operations, offensive counterterrorism operations, the detention, interrogation, and prosecution of terrorism suspects, including military commissions, the domestic use of the military, homeland security, cybersecurity, and other current issues in the national security area.

Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this course, it is expected that you will:

- understand the interbranch context in which national security law operates;
- be able to identify key themes of national security law;
- know if a career in national security law is for you, and/or what aspects of national security law you can expect to encounter in your legal career;
- understand the various facets of national security law, and how it shapes our world today.
