Course Description and Learning Outcomes:

In this course, we will cover the common-law and statutory rules of evidence applicable in civil and criminal trials in the United States, focusing on the Federal Rules of Evidence. We will study practical matters such as burdens of proof, objections, motions *in limine*, and preservation of the record, as well as more specific doctrinal issues such as relevance and character evidence, hearsay and its exceptions, witness competency, and expert testimony.

The course is intended to be the first step toward a career in trial practice. During the course, students will gain experience thinking on their feet and navigating the various problems that emerge as evidence is taken in real time. By the end of the semester, students will be able to explain the origins and rationale for the rules of evidence and recognize the real-world situations that trigger the application of particular concepts. Most importantly, students will be able to apply the rules to the type of fact patterns that commonly emerge in civil and criminal trials in the same manner that experienced trial lawyers do.

Attendance, Participation, and Classroom Behavior: This is a mandatory attendance class. Evidence is an inherently interactive subject, and hence students must be prepared to participate actively in every class session. Use of laptops for note-taking is permitted but should not interfere with participation in classroom discussion. **<u>Grading</u>**: There will be one comprehensive final exam at the end of the semester. The exam will be open book and consist of short-answer questions based on hypothetical scenarios similar to those covered in class. All student grades will be based on the exam, subject to a potential one-half grade adjustment for in-class performance.

<u>Class Schedule and Reading Assignments</u>: To be prepared for each class session, students should read the assigned pages from the Park & Friedman textbook as well as the assigned Rules from the Federal Rules of Evidence.
