SYLLABUS

Course: Law 171-R01: Congressional Oversight

Professor: Andrew Block

Semester: Spring 2024 Semester, Winter Intersession

Book: There is no assigned book for this class. Readings will be assigned from a variety of sources and links will be supplied where necessary.

Class Meetings: This class will meet during the Winter 2024 Intersession. Class meetings will be virtual, held over Zoom, and occur from 3pm to 5pm Weekdays from January 3, through January 11.

Students are expected to be on video for the duration of each class. This is intended to be an interactive class with ample discussion so I will assume that if your camera is off that you are unable to participate at that time. We will aim to have a 10-minute break each day near the middle of the class.

Participation & Grading: This is a Credit/No Credit class. In order to earn credit, students must be in class (on camera) 80% of the time, participate in discussions, and complete the assignments. There will also be a writing project assigned during class and due by the end of Day on January 15, 2024.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Identify the various sources of Congressional authority to conduct investigations, and articulate powers that come from those authorities.
- 2. Identify the tools Congress has to conduct fact-finding and oversight.
- 3. Draft an oversight request for a Member of Congress or response to an oversight request for the recipient of such request.
- 4. Formulate legal arguments for or against a particular oversight activity in furtherance of a client's goals.
