Contracts II Law 103 Professor Zywicki January 2025 (*Updated Jan 8*, 2025)

COURSE OVERVIEW/DESCRIPTION:

This is a continuation to your fall course that provides an introduction to the common law of contracts and where appropriate the Uniform Commercial Code. Contracts II will focus on the topics of contract interpretation, performance obligations, breach, and remedies.

This class is a scheduled as an in-person class. However, from time-to-time it may be necessary to have this class meet in a virtual format due to weather, health, university policy, unavailability, or other contingencies. Dates for virtual meetings will be announced at a later date.

COURSE MATERIALS: Course materials will be the same as Contracts I.

CLASS MEETINGS: Class will meet every Monday and Wednesday from 1:50-3:15. Each class will also be broadcast over Zoom and recorded for later access for students who are unable to attend in person. The permanent Zoom link for all class meetings will be https://gmu.zoom.us/j/9786383043.

From time to time I will have to cancel class for other professional obligations. I will be out of town on January 29, March 17, and March 19 for Law & Economics Center commitments. We will make up those classes either in-person or online.

FINAL EXAM: The final exam will be April 29 at Noon. The format will be open code.

OFFICE HOURS: Office hours will be after class on Monday-Wednesday (3:15-4:00). From time to time I will be unable to meet for regularly-scheduled office hours for other commitments so please confirm ahead of time if possible that I will be able to keep my scheduled office hours on any given day. I will also be available by appointment on other days.

LEARNING OUTCOMES: By the end of the course students should have acquired/be able to:

• Understand the doctrines related to contract evidence and interpretation

- Understand the doctrines related to performance obligations and the interaction of implied and expressed terms
- Understand the doctrine of breach and excuse doctrines
- Understand the system of contract remedies for breach
- Understand the role of contract law as part of the system of private ordering within a market economy

BASIS OF EVALUATION & ASSESSMENTS

- Grading will be based on a final exam on a date to be determined by the law school. Exam format will likely be a combination of multiple choice and essay questions. The exam will be based on material covered in class and class discussion.
- **Class participation**: I reserve the right to increase any student's final grade by one-third letter grade increment based on exemplary class performance.

INSTRUCTOR EXPECTATIONS

- Students are expected to be prepared for class each day.
- Expected reading assignments for each class are provided below but are subject to revision as the semester proceeds. Efforts will be made to remain consistent with this expected schedule but will be adapted to the needs of the class. Reading assignments for each subsequent class will be announced at the conclusion of each class.

COURSE RULES/STRUCTURE:

- I will "cold call" on several students each class to solicit class discussion.
- Students who are participating online will be expected to have your cameras on and prepared to participate if called on. At all other times, please mute your mic.

EMAIL COMMUNICATION: Students must use their MasonLive email account to receive important University information, including communications related to this class.

ATTENDANCE: Regular and punctual attendance are required to earn academic credit. Attendance requirements for academic credit will follow the policies set forth in Academic Regulation 4-1.
